- Strategies to Help Children Memorize Bible Verses
- 1. Pray with your child about memorizing the Bible. Pray for understanding and clear thinking.
- 2. Memorize verses along with your child. Many things are easy when you have a buddy. Practice reciting verses together at the supper table, in the car, etc.
- 3. Write the verse on note cards (word by word or a verse per card) that can be carried around or kept in the car and reviewed throughout the day and week.
- 4. Sing the verse. Make up your own tunes to go with the verse or pick familiar melodies to go with the words. Many verses are already put to music.
- 5. For visual learners, draw a picture to represent the words in the verse or the meaning of the verse. Use the drawing to visualize the verse as it is memorized.
- Have your child type the verse using the free handwriting font available at this link: <u>https://www.zaner-bloser.com/sites/default/files/public/FontsOnline\_Sampler/index.html</u>
  Then your child can practice handwriting and work on memorizing the verse by tracing over the words.
- 7. Say, listen, write, and repeat. Repetition is a productive strategy for memorizing. Read the verse aloud. Listen to the verse being read aloud. Write or type the verse. Repeat the process.
- 8. Create motions or actions for reciting the verse or key points/ideas within the verse.
- 9. Write the verse on index cards or sticky-notes. Place the notes on your bathroom mirror, nightstand, in the school locker, in the car, etc.
- 10. Rap it out. Recite the verse in rhythm. Stomp your feet, clap your hands, or bounce a ball in time with the words.
- 11. Type the verse on the computer. Read it a couple of times and then delete a few words (from the beginning, the end, or throughout). Try to say the verse without those words.
- 12. Write each word of the verse on index cards. Turn the index cards over so the words are not showing. Mix up the cards. Flip each card over, putting the verse in order, word by word.
- 13. Think through the logical flow and parts of speech of the verse. Notice the subject of the passage and what is said about that subject. Notice the verbs and how they relate to the subject. Notice the order of events or ideas.
- 14. Act the verse out with charades, dramatizing the verse words and meaning.
- 15. Review the verse multiple times each day. Read or recite the verse right when you wake up and right before you go to bed.
