Who wrote it? That's the question. Even today, scholars are divided on who wrote Hebrews. Who read it? This letter is for Christians who heard about Jesus via other witnesses (2:3).

Hebrews is the second-most doctrine-heavy New Testament book (Romans is first)¹.



The author says Hebrews is a brief letter (13:22) but it's the longest general epistle (unless you include Revelation).

Hebrews was probably written around 60 A.D.¹, before Herod's Temple had been destroyed.


