Perhaps you have heard an instruction from a parent, teacher, or someone in authority prefaced by these words, "Now pay attention." Have you ever given much thought as to what would happen if you did NOT pay attention? If you were receiving directions, you may end up in the wrong place! If you were given a recipe to follow, the end result may not taste very good. And if you were being given tips for studying for a test, you might not do as well as you would have liked.

Do you take notice when you hear the words listen, pay attention, or gain understanding? The book of Proverbs is full of these admonitions. In Proverbs 4, Solomon weaves these commands throughout the entire chapter. He instructs us to get wisdom and to hold on to instruction.



As we enter a new school year, our focus and attention are on the heart. We have chosen Proverbs 4:23 as our Year Verse. "Above all else, guard your heart, for everything you do flows from it." The context (v. 20-27) in which this verse is found is powerful. Solomon encourages his son to pay attention to his teachings because they will transform who he is as they penetrate deep into his heart. "A lifelong commitment to follow wisdom requires a change of heart" (NLT Study Bible Notes, Tyndale).

Why are we so interested in the hearts of our students? Because there is a constant battle and struggle for their hearts. The heart is the center of our emotions, feelings, thinking, and desires. It encompasses our values and actions. When Solomon refers to guarding the heart, he means the inner core of a person—the thoughts, feelings, desires, will, and choices that make that person

who he/she is. To guard your heart means you fill it with truth and then you make sure you guard that truth, so you do not forget it, compromise it, neglect it, or ignore it. A.W. Pink said, "For the Christian to keep his heart...means for him to pay close attention to the direction in which his affections are moving, to discover whether the things of the world are gaining a firmer and fuller hold over him, or whether they are increasingly losing their charm for him."

Pay attention. Guard your heart, for EVERYTHING you do flows from it! And when you do, you will experience the joy and security that comes from knowing and following the Lord Jesus

CELEBRATING THE CLASS OF 2020

Wheaton Christian Grammar School graduated its sixty-four members of the Class of 2020 on May 26 through a virtual commencement and many unique celebrations. Although this year's graduation looked different because of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Class of 2020 celebrated their accomplishments with joy and perseverance; living out their class verses, Romans 5:3-5 (NIV): "Not only so, but we also rejoice in our sufferings, because we know that suffering produces perseverance; perseverance, character; and character, hope. The celebrations the Class of 2020 kicked off a few weeks prior to graduation with an at home visit for each of the graduates from administrators and teachers. Students were met cheering, noise makers, and congratulations as they were delivered a celebratory vard sign and goodie bag full of cookies, streamers, and other celebration items. 

Faculty Spotlight:

Pete Lindner and Antonio Rodriguez

How did the Lord lead you to WCGS?

Pete: I had been working for a few different companies as a marine engineer onboard ocean-going ships, which had me spending six months out of the year away from home. Between jobs, I had been actively volunteering at WCGS during my free time, assisting the custodian when he had a task that he did not normally do like repairing electrical and heating and cooling equipment. This was back in the early 90's. Numerous people were asking and encouraging me to consider working for the school, so I decided to follow the Lord's guidance and finally made the decision to change careers.

Antonio: When my wife started working at WCGS in 2014, I started to volunteer with Pete in the mornings before my regular job. During this time, I started to notice that the community and environment was different here from where I was working. God put a little whisper in my mind that working at WCGS would be a great transition.

What are your responsibilities at WCGS?

Pete: As the Director of Maintenance, I manage building maintenance and grounds. I oversee the life safety requirements to keep us in line with building codes for the Village of Winfield, Carol Stream Fire Department, Illinois Department of Public Health, and Illinois Board of Education, as well as assisting in security and COVID-19 efforts. My favorite thing to do is troubleshoot and get things up and running again.

Antonio: During the school year, my responsibilities are leading and providing training for the second shift custodial crew, setting up and breaking down events, and performing maintenance around the building.

How have you seen the Lord work at WCGS?

Pete: I appreciate the leadership at WCGS. Our administrators are top notch, and I appreciate their focus on relationships, prayer, and their concern for the community's spiritual growth. This has been the best place to have all five of my children attend. They received a Christian education and were nurtured by administration, faculty, and staff. Now, I am able to see a few of my grandkids come to school each day and experience the same things.







Antonio: During my time at WCGS, I've seen the Lord work in many situations. One way is when someone in our community needs help. From staff to parents, this is a community that comes together to not only pray, but to also be the hands and feet of Jesus to help in any way they can. I've experienced this personally, and can say that I truly felt the love of God through the WCGS community.

Are there any new initiatives that have taken place in your work because of COVID-19?

Pete: For the facility, I am working with the administration and health staff to monitor what changes we will need to be made for the new school year. We will proceed forward with an abundance of caution and examine closely what those in the government will require of us. We are learning new things every week.

I believe we are already doing a great job of cleaning and disinfecting. Our teaching and nursing staff are especially mindful of those with compromised health issues, and the trained maintenance department will be there to support them when extra services might be needed. With the Lord's help, we will overcome the obstacles to change and persevere.

Antonio: COVID-19 has brought a new set of rules and precautions that we need to follow. Since the closing of school in March, we have been disinfecting and preparing our building for when students return. When school resumes, we will be working harder than ever to keep things disinfected and clean so our community can stay healthy.

We are grateful for our entire maintenance team and how they take such immaculate care of our building and grounds. They have worked especially hard over the past few months to keep our school clean, and we appreciate all they do behind the scenes to keep things running. The entire WCGS community is abundantly blessed by their work!



COVID-19 Campus Update


