# STRIVING for Excellence



Every year, WCGS looks for new ways to provide a better education for its students. For the 2018-2019 school year, there were many new initiatives that are helping our students grow emotionally and academically.

One of the new initiatives involved the hiring of a school social worker, Mrs. Mandy Jasper (pictured to the left). As the school social worker, she works on enhancing the academic and spiritual mission of WCGS. Her role helps bridge the home and school community by helping students with issues that affect their school performance, behavior, and socialization.

During this first half of the school year she has held new-student lunches where they play games and talk about life, as well as giving presentations in classrooms on how to handle various situations and to observe student behavior.

Another addition to the 2018-2019 curriculum is the integration of Spanish in grades K–2. Mrs. Valerie Busch was hired on this year to help further the WCGS mission "to educate, train,



and nurture children for godliness and excellence, equipping them to engage and transform their world for Jesus Christ." Students get taught multiple times a week to learn the Spanish language as well as Hispanic culture.

As STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Mathematics) programs are growing all over the country, WCGS wanted to create a space for our elementary students to gain a deeper understanding of these topics. A classroom in the K–4 hallway is there for students to meet with WCGS STEAM leader, Mrs. Lauriat (pictured above), to develop further skills that will help them in their academics.

WCGS is grateful for the opportunity to help further grow our students' hearts and minds so they can be equipped to better serve Jesus in this world.



### **38 YEAR LEGACY AT WCGS**

An interview with two former WCGS families

The Anderson and Gieser families have spent a total of 38 years in the WCGS community. Being anywhere for 38 years has a tremendous impact on one's life. This is why we asked both families to answer a few questions and reflect on their time at WCGS after they both graduated their youngest child in May of 2018.

#### How has WCGS had an impact your family?

- Andersons: WCGS had a huge impact on our family. Our children received a Christ-centered education in an extremely nurturing and spiritually sensitive environment that is part of the foundation of who they are todav. When our oldest son was diagnosed with leukemia in 8th grade, the entire WCGS community jumped into action and provided direct encouragement, prayer, and support to each member of the family. For this, we are forever grateful. WCGS is much more than a school. It is a vibrant Christian community that blends great education with a full community experience.
- Giesers: WCGS has had a tremendous impact on our family. Our children were trained to identify the ungodly messages being promoted by our culture so they would not be taken "captive through hollow and deceptive philosophy" (Colossians 2:8). While in the 3<sup>rd</sup> grade, our youngest son would be reading quietly in another room and suddenly shout, "I found a 'hollow and deceptive philosophy'!" We would smile hearing those big words come from the mouth of our 3rd grader and were thrilled at the discernment he had been taught. To this day, our children continue to spot the messages in our culture that seek to negatively influence their Christian worldview.

#### What would you say is the benefit of a WCGS education and how have you seen it play out in your children's lives?

Andersons: WCGS prepared our children for life. The excellent academics, spiritual development, and nurturing environment all contributed to their success in high school, college, and as young adults. WCGS helped our oldest son develop a strong character and reliance on the Lord that carried him through his illness. Our second oldest wasn't a reader in first grade, but through proper intervention and encouragement, he has become one of the most ferocious readers we know. Our daughter benefited from the strong academics and excelled in high school, and our youngest had the

opportunity to enjoy many different extracurricular activities that built integrity, teamwork, and a strong work ethic. An education from WCGS is a blessing that benefits every child.

Our children had the opportunity to explore and Giesers: develop their academic, musical, and athletic gifts through excellent classroom instruction and extracurricular activities provided by WCGS. More importantly, however, was the spiritual training that our children received. A biblical worldview is taught in the classroom and reinforced in chapels and all student activities. Through WCGS, our children had many opportunities to put their faith in action in our community and around the world. Whether serving at WCGS, PADS, FMSC, Pacific Garden Mission, performing music at local homes or community events, nursina or traveling to the Dominican Republic, our children began to look at other's needs with compassion and to develop hearts for serving others. We have seen this interest in service play out as our children continue to desire to serve in their schools, family, church, and communities.

#### As you reflect on your time at WCGS, do you have any other comments or stories you'd like to add?

- We were convinced to choose WCGS when we Andersons: experienced the prayer support shared at a Kindergarten Roundup for a school family in critical need. Little did we know that the Lord was leading our family to WCGS to become a recipient of that prayer during our own time of critical need.
- The impact of WCGS on our family began when I Giesers: (Sarah) was a student. My father died suddenly in my 7th grade year. During those difficult days, the faculty, staff, and administration rallied around me and my family with tremendous love, support, and prayers. My 6th grade teacher, Miss Bingham, sent me a note to let me know she was praying for me every year on the anniversary of his death until her own passing several years ago. The WCGS faculty and staff continue to be committed to building meaningful. long lasting relationships with students. The relationships my children formed with teachers. administrators, and coaches continue through notes and words of encouragement they receive.

# MAKING EVERY DAY COUNT IN THE 2018-2019 SCHOOL YEAR

How have you been making every day count? This question is what the WCGS community is seeking to answer during the 2018-2019 school year. Based on the book, *Make Every Day Count, Teen Edition* by Max Lucado, the WCGS administration chose to do a school-wide theme this year because they wanted every student at WCGS to have the same central focus each month – discussing that month's theme in the classroom, in the hallways, in chapels, and in daily conversation. The hope is that those discussions will continue at home as students share what they have learned and the experiences that have shaped their understanding. Each month's theme is based on a chapter in the book:

> Make Every Day Count Faith for Fear-Filled Days Gratitude for Ungrateful Days Peace for Stressed-Out Days Hope for Catastrophic Days Fuel for Drained Days Passion for Purposeless Days Service for Fork-in-the-Road Days Forgiveness for Sour Days Grace for Guilty Days



Already in the first three months of the year, we have seen a positive impact on the culture within our school. The monthly themes have created consistency in our vocabulary from kindergarten through 8th grade and have created a sense of unity as they work towards a similar goal each month. God is at work in the hearts of these children!

The concept of a school-wide theme came from a parent request to have a biblical Jr. High Summer Reading book. This led to the question, "How can we make this have more of an impact?" Participating in summer reading strengthens a student's analysis and discussion skills, but we wanted this to also impact their hearts... and not just the hearts of Jr. Highers, but of all our students, K–8.

The book, *Make Every Day Count*, is based on a very familiar verse from the Bible which says, "This is the day that the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it" (Psalm 118:24). Our purpose as Christ-followers is to glorify God. This book gives us the opportunity to practice making a diligent choice every day to live for Christ while we teach, learn, and live together.

I believe that our student body can be difference-makers in this community. This starts with them being able to maximize opportunities that God has placed before them each day. – Marc Painter, *Principal* 

The monthly themes are the focus of our *Continuing the Discussion...* parent series as well. The first sessions have included a coffee with the administration, a panel of teachers talking about technology, and a family activity night focusing on gratitude led by WCGS Social Worker, Mrs. Mandy Jasper.

This year's school verses state, "Be very careful, then, how you live—not as unwise but as wise, making the most of every opportunity, because the days are evil" (Ephesians 5:15-16). As a school, we want to make the most of each day we have been given with our students, doing our best to help shape a biblical worldview, bring unity, practice Christ-like behavior, and focus on what really matters.

We don't expect our school-wide theme to cause students to walk around with a smile on their faces all day, every day. God knows that some seconds, some minutes, and even some hours are going to be difficult for each of us. However, that is why God gave us a



"day," 24 hours. In the book, Max Lucado shares some great words about rejoicing each day: "An hour is too short, a year is too long. Days are the bite-size portions of life, the God-designed segments of life management." God doesn't demand that we rejoice every second. But He does ask that as we go through each day, we pause and take time to rejoice in it.

The class is continuously working together to find God-sightings, and the connections the 1<sup>st</sup> graders make are remarkable and tender!

Sue decided that she wanted to become a teacher when she was in  $2^{nd}$  grade, so working with her students every day is a dream come true. She is grateful to be able to play a part in her students' lives.



## Thank you for joining our crew at the Scholarship Benefit & Auction!
